While the village is named after the activities of its skilled craftsmen back in the day, the malay word "meramu" means collecting of wood and other materials used to build houses. They make fine handiwork to this day, as they branch out into producing other high-quality goods that will contribute to local cottage industries.





Pottery House

As the owner of the most-decorated home in the water village, Awang Ahmad Bin Haji Timbang loves embellishing his abode with decorative items to complement the ever-changing colour of its walls. Aside from its many ornaments, the house is also known for the variety of flower pots that surround the house front on all ends.

2 Arch Maker

A craft that was passed down from his father, Pengiran Haji Ibrahim, Awangku Suhaimi is now the resident arch maker in this village. Along with crafting wooden arches to be displayed at national events and functions,

Awangku Suhaimi also mans the artwork that goes on the final products, with some help from close friends and neighbours. Aside from arches, he also crafts furniture such as chairs, tables

3 Boat Maker

Affordable, fast and convenient with no hint of traffic, the "perahu" or boat (usually attached with a motor at the back) has long been a trusted and reliable mode of transportation for the residents of Kampong Ayer. The skill of perahu or boat making is still very much alive in this modern era. Take time to visit and watch how these wooden boats are crafted with the use of both traditional and modern tools.

Once you're done exploring Kampong Ayer, why not explore the capital? Here are some suggestions:

Admire the Omar 'Ali Saifuddien Mosque

One of the most magnificent landmarks in the capital and the rest of the sultanate, this beautiful mosque, named after the 28th Sultan of Brunei, was open to the public in 1958 and still remains a sight to behold.

2 Grab a bite at Mei Kong

Stop by Mei Kong Restaurant (108, Jalan Pemancha), a local favourite that serves a fantastic plate of kolo mee.



3 Take a stroll around Taman

Opened in October 2017, this 12-hectare park is located next to the Omar 'Ali Saifuddien Mosque,

and features manicured lawns adorned with shrubs,

brightly coloured flowers and exotic baobab trees.

4 Visit the Royal Regalia Museum

This museum is a tribute to His Majesty the Sultan of Brunei and features a main gallery that presents a recreation of the coronation of His Majesty the Sultan, displaying the gilded carriage that carried the newly crowned ruler through the streets. There are also galleries showcasing grand trappings of royalty, such as jewel-encrusted crowns, thrones, garments, and His Majesty's revered silver keris (dagger).

5 Enjoy a meal with a view

There are some fantastic selections of cuisine located at the waterfront that allows you to dine with a view of the water village. Head over to Kaizen Sushi Restauant for Japanese cuisine, or at Horizons Seafood Restaurant an excellent assortment of Western and Asian fare and succulent seafood choices.

6 Check out traditional arts and crafts

Located at Jalan Residency, the Brunei Arts and Handicraft Training Centre showcases Brunei's traditional arts and crafts. In here, beautifull designed galleries showcase displays of kair tenunan, intricately hand-tooled silverware brass-work, wood-carving and basketry.

Try ambuyat

Try Brunei's famous dish! This glutinous and chewy sago-based meal is twirled around a candas and then dipped in an assortment o exotic sauces with other condiments. Enjoy this dish at Tarindak D'Seni (Jalan Residency located behind the Brunei Arts and Handicraft Training Centre) with a fantastic panoramic view of Kampong Ayer.



8 Shop at Tamu Kianggeh

A visit to a tamu (outdoor market) is a truly authentic Bruneian experience. Located at the Kianggeh River, drop by Tamu Kianggeh for a full-on sensory adventure. Buy a snack and nibble while you shop for handicrafts, local fruits and vegetables, and some local

Boats

Boat building which is still available at Kampong Peramu, is a traditional art that has been passed down from generation to generation, and until today residents of the water village use these boats for their daily commute to the mainland.

2 Local Handicrafts

One of the best examples of preserving our heritage can be found in Kampong Ayer, and cottage industries producing local handicrafts such as tudung saji, baskets, mats and fans with the use of nipah leaves can also be bought at Kampong Ayer

Wooden bridges

Some villages in Kampong Ayer are connected by wooden bridges known as pail, a unique feature of the water village used for residents and visitors to travel from one village to another.

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KAMPONG LURONG SIKUNA TRAIL



Back in the heyday of Kampong Ayer's time as a bustling port, plenty of sailing ships called "schooners" often made their way across the river and settled in the area now known as Kampong Lurong Sikuna. Therefore the name Lurong Sikuna is derived from a Bruneian translation of the word "schooner lane".

Visit the village head, Haji Ahmad Bujang, and sit down for a chat, and he will enlighten you on the everyday life and history about the establishment of Kampong Ayer. Located at the modern settlement of Kampong Ayer, his house is both a bed and breakfast and a tribute to the local culture, housing an array of local artefacts. A *pelamin* is the centerpiece, which is a decorated dais often used at Brunei Malay weddings.

2 Prawn Crackers

Maker

This is where the first school in Kampong Ayer was built, in the early 50's. It was more than a school to the villagers; Sekolah Melayu Laila Menchanai was a venue for village councils to meet and in the evenings, films were screened from a projector for the villagers. The school tragically burned down in 1962.
